Welcome to the Prefectural Citizens' Forest

Located 500-1,000m from Mt. Iwate's northern foot, the Prefectural Citizens' Forest is a 360ha. vast forest park. The facility was opened in 1968 and through hosting national tree-planting (1974) and tree-raising (1984) events has grown into what you see today.

The forest is mainly man-made karamatsu (*Larix kaempferi*) groves and deciduous broad-leaf trees. It is inhabited by many wild animals and birds such as the Japanese serow.

Park facilities include the Forestry Museum, Woodcraft Ctr. and campground, allowing visitors to deepen their understanding of forests, the forestry industry and the natural world. Nature observation events and woodcraft workshops are also held from time to time.

You can readily experience the beauty of Iwate in every season at Iwate Prefectural Citizens' Forest. We await your visit.

Forestry Museum (free admission)



Learn through play about the nature, forests and forestry industry found at the foot of Mt. Iwate. The building is made of timber grown in Iwate
Prefecture giving off warmth and a woody aroma.

At the entrance, you will be welcomed by a display of 100 year old beech and red pine trees. Get to know the forests through fun displays, forestry dioramas, etc.

The campground is in a forest running along Matsukawa Gorge. It has wooden decks on which to set up tents, outdoor toilets and camp kitchen.

The children's corner is full of wooden play equipment!



A wooden pool containing 3,000 individual hinoki cypress balls of 3.5cm diameter resembles Hachimantai Dragon Eye. Enter inside and you will be gently enveloped in the lovely smell of hinoki cypress. There are three chicks mixed in with the wooden balls.

See if you can find them!

With a height of 90cm and a length of 190cm even small children can safely enjoy this compact wooden slide.

The surface of the slide was finished with layers of urushi lacquer by a local craftsperson. Please savor the feeling of gliding smoothly over the urushi lacquer.





"Our wooden home" is a model residence constructed from timber.

Inside is a wooden kitchen with a wide collection of wooden tableware and food allowing children to enjoy playing house. There are also plenty of the finest wooden toys. Children can play comfortably in the timber's warmth.

Our secret treehouse

The highlight of the museum is a two-story wooden fortress with ladders and ropes for climbing adventures. The very popular 11m long tube slide is a great thrill.
